>ACTS 9:26-28; 11:21-26

²⁶ And when he had come to Jerusalem, he attempted to join the disciples. And they were all afraid of him, for they did not believe that he was a disciple. ²⁷ But Barnabas took him and brought him to the apostles and declared to them how on the road he had seen the Lord, who spoke to him, and how at Damascus he had preached boldly in the name of Jesus. ²⁸ So he went in and out among them at Jerusalem, preaching boldly in the name of the Lord.

²¹And the hand of the Lord was with them, and a great number who believed turned to the Lord. ²² The report of this came to the ears of the church in Jerusalem, and they sent Barnabas to Antioch. ²³ When he came and saw the grace of God, he was glad, and he exhorted them all to remain faithful to the Lord with steadfast purpose, ²⁴ for he was a good man, full of the Holy Spirit and of faith. And a great many people were added to the Lord. ²⁵ So Barnabas went to Tarsus to look for Saul, ²⁶ and when he had found him, he brought him to Antioch. For a whole year they met with the church and taught a great many people. And in Antioch the disciples were first called Christians.

When I was a kid, there were all sorts of things my parents made me do: brush my teeth, clean my room, and when I was a little older, cut the grass. 

The 7 Arrows of **Bible Reading**



Day One **ROMANS 1:8**

Paul wrote this letter to the church in Rome. Though he'd desired to visit these Christians and get to know them on a personal level, he hadn't been able to make it. But he'd heard about them, just like many others throughout the world. The people in the Roman church had been transformed through knowing Christ. This affected everything about their lives, and people couldn't help but notice. Because Rome was essentially the center of the world, people came from all over, and when they left, they talked about these Christians wherever they went. Knowing that these people were living faithful lives—and that the news of Jesus was spreading because of their faithfulness-was a great encouragement to Paul. We need to live the same way as this young church in Rome.

Day Two ROMANS 1:9



Following his encounter with the risen Christ, Paul committed his life to serving the Lord and immediately began preaching the good news of Jesus wherever he went (Acts 9:20). Having been a Jewish religious leader, Paul knew what it was to follow the law for all the wrong reasons, and it was all empty. But after coming to faith, Paul knew what it was to worship (the literal meaning of "serve") not out of duty, but from his heart. And one of the most important ways Paul served God, making His worth known, was to share the gospel with the people he encountered.

Day Three **ROMANS 1:10**

Paul genuinely wanted to visit the Christians in Rome. It is likely that the church was started by people who came to faith in Christ at Pentecost. They'd been in Jerusalem for the festival, and when they returned back to Rome, they began their own Christian community. However, they'd never been led by anyone with apostolic authority, and Paul wanted to visit so he could instruct them in essential matters. Plus, because Paul was a Roman citizen, the city and the church there likely had a special place in his heart. But God hadn't yet made a way for Paul to go there, and instead, he wrote this letter to share what he was thinking. Thankfully, today we have the Book of Romans which helps us to understand so much about salvation by grace through faith, the nature of the law, judgment against sin, and more.

One of the specific reasons Paul wanted to visit was so they would understand the spiritual gifts and how they are to be used in the life of the church. When we come to faith in Christ. the Holy Spirit gives every believer a spiritual gift to be used in building up the church. Some are preachers and teachers, which is essential in the church. Others are servants or encouragers, and these are just as essential. Having a spiritual gift is a great privilege. It's also a responsibility, because God wants to use our gifts to impact others, and if we don't put them to use, others miss out on what we have to offer. Paul knew that for the church in Rome to thrive, they needed to receive, understand, and apply their spiritual gifts.

Among the reasons Paul wanted to visit Rome was not only to encourage them, but to receive encouragement from these faithful believers. He'd heard stories of their faithfulness, yet he wanted to hear from them firsthand. One of the greatest ways we can encourage one another is by walking side-by-side with our friends in faithful living. At times, following Jesus will be difficult. After all, He said the world will come against us. But when we have fellow believers alongside us who are living faithfully, this is one of the greatest encouragements we can know.
