

#### > ROMANS 3:20-28

<sup>20</sup> For by works of the law no human being will be justified in his sight, since through the law comes knowledge of sin.

<sup>21</sup>But now the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law, although the Law and the Prophets bear witness to it—22 the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction: <sup>23</sup> for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, <sup>24</sup> and are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, <sup>25</sup> whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith. This was to show God's righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over former sins. <sup>26</sup> It was to show his

righteousness at the present time, so that he might be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus.

<sup>27</sup>Then what becomes of our boasting? It is excluded. By what kind of law? By a law of works? No, but by the law of faith. 28 For we hold that one is justified by faith apart from works of the law.

SALVATION

Before the beginning of time. God's plan for salvation centered on Iesus' death and resurrection. which makes salvation possible.

My wife does an incredible job homeschooling our children. She works hard, and the kids generally respect her. But there have been a few days when, while I'm away at work, I'll get a call saying something like this: "Our son will not listen to anything I say! Will you please talk to him?"

There are times when relationships are interrupted—two parties are not on the same page, are not willing to listen, or we do our best to share our perspectives, but we can't speak in a way that others can understand. The truth is because all people are sinful and have more than our fair share of weaknesses, we're going to experience a lack of unity, personal struggles, and even conflict with others. Our friends at school will hurt or disappoint us—and we'll do the same to them—our teachers won't understand why we struggle with the work, and our parents will seem so unfair.

When we struggle to live on the same page with those who are important in our lives, we need a mediator to step in and bridge the gap. Another area where we all need a mediator is in our relationship with God. It's a divide we cannot fix, and just as my wife needed me to step in to help my son obey, we desperately need a mediator to step in to bring us back to God. Thankfully, God has provided a mediator in Jesus.

#### LEVELS OF BIBLICAL LEARNING // SALVATION

Before the beginning of time, God's plan for salvation centered on Jesus' death and resurrection, which makes salvation possible.

Many people today believe we are saved by living a good life (salvation by works) or even because we believe in God. However, the Bible is clear—God's standard of "good" is Jesus, and we all fall desperately short. No one could ever be nearly good enough to earn God's favor. Only Jesus' sacrifice could pay the debt we owe, and only through His death and resurrection can we receive salvation.

### >CHRIST

Read Psalm 51:16-17.

What does this say about God's desires for our lives concerning:

OUR WORKS	OUR HEARTS

When are you tempted to think God is pleased with you because of your works? How do you need to adjust your perspective?

Pray every day this week that God would help you to live in obedience to Him, not in an effort to earn His favor, but as an expression of the love for Him that's in your heart.

### **>COMMUNITY**

The Bible calls us to confess our sins not only to God, but to one another (Jas. 5:16). This brings healing in our lives.

### > CULTURE

This good news about salvation is not intended to be kept to ourselves.

# Day One ROMANS 10:1-2

Paul, who wrote the book of Romans, loved the Jews and had a deep desire that they would turn to God in faith. God had given them the Scriptures, and they had their responsibility to follow the law very seriously. However, they'd misunderstood one important detail—no one could ever be saved by following the law. The law revealed the character of God and His expectations for His people, but it also revealed that we are sinners and incapable of fulfilling the law. This is why we all need a Savior. Though the Jews worked hard to obey the law, they didn't obey "according to knowledge." Paul prayed that God would open their eyes to see that their works were empty and that they would trust Jesus to save them. Today, there are many people who say, "I'm a good person." This is what the Jews thought too. Yet their goodness fell desperately short of deserving salvation. Paul prayed they would see the truth, and we need to pray for our friends that they would recognize their need for Jesus.

What is the standard for "good" in our culture today?

Why isn't this enough to live in relationship with God?

#### Day Two **ROMANS 10:3-4**



Righteousness refers to someone's being perfectly "right" in relation to the law. God's Word is the perfect standard of good vs. bad, right vs. wrong, so to be righteous is to be perfectly in line with what God has declared is right. Throughout the Old Testament times, God's people were required to live according to the law as an expression of their hearts' desire to obey Him. Yet, no matter how hard they tried, they could never live up to God's requirements. However, when Jesus came, He changed the standard. Jesus fulfilled the law when no one else ever could. Therefore, righteousness is no longer a matter of working to obey the law (which was impossible anyway)—instead, righteousness comes from trusting Jesus. Salvation comes not from works, but from faith.

### Day Three **ROMANS 10:5-7**

God gave the law through Moses, and the standard or righteousness was perfect obedience. In James 2:10, we learn that to keep the whole law, yet to stumble at one tiny point, is to be guilty of breaking the whole law. Many people recognize that they've stumbled or sinned, yet instead of simply acknowledging their hopeless condition, they set out to make it right. Many have tried to go up to heaven thinking they can work their way to God. Others would go down into the abyss believing they could find a way to resurrect themselves. But repairing what sin has broken in our lives could never be accomplished through human effort, no matter how heroic. Perfect righteousness is available only through Jesus, and this means accepting that we are irreparably and irreversibly broken apart from God's intervening in our lives.

When have you tried to do heroic things so God would be happy with you?

Why is stumbling in one point an offense against the whole law?

## Day Four ROMANS 10:8-9

True righteousness that brings us into relationship with God isn't found through some epic journey to the heights and depths of creation. Instead, the way we are made right with God is much simpler—faith in Jesus. Faith is first associated with a confession. Confess is literally with-speak, which means to agree with God about what is right and wrong. To confess that Jesus is Lord means to surrender everything of ourselves to Him, agreeing that He is the only way to the Father. Further, faith requires that the things we confess flow out of a heart that is fully convinced that all the Bible savs about Jesus is true. And one of the most important truths is that Jesus died for our sins and was raised from the dead. The only way to be saved from sin is to believe in Jesus and surrender to Him as Lord.

What does it mean to "confess" Jesus as Lord?

## Day Five ROMANS 10:10



Saving faith begins in the heart and then flows out through our lives, including our words, thoughts, actions, relationships, and more. Yet for those who don't believe, we may think it's impossible simply to change their hearts. The truth of the matter is it's difficult enough to change our own passions and desires, and we could never change anyone else's heart. That's why it's so important to pray and trust God to work. This doesn't mean we're not responsible to love people well. God uses the ways we treat others to impact their hearts. Yet, when it's all said and done, it's up to God to transform people's desires, including our own.

When have you wanted someone to change, but there was nothing you could do about it?

How do you demonstrate trust in God's purposes each day?
