>1 CORINTHIANS 15:1-8

POINT

¹Now I would remind you, brothers, of the gospel I preached to you, which you received, in which you stand, ² and by which you are being saved, if you hold fast to the word I preached to you—unless you believed in vain.

³ For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, ⁴ that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures, ⁵ and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. ⁶ Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have fallen asleep. ⁷ Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. ⁸ Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me.



THE BIBLE MEETS LIFE

FACT:

In 2011, there was widespread rioting in the UK, which included looting and vandalism throughout London. Though many other businesses were destroyed, bookstores were unexplainably spared.¹



For most of us, national or global news stories are just that—stories we read about on the Internet. However, for the relatively few, they experience these things first-hand. In April 2015, there was an incident in Baltimore that sparked riots, which became a national story. Only a couple months after my family had moved into the city, we locked ourselves in our small, city row home for three days as rioters and ruffians smashed car windows and burned out shops on our street. For a moment that had a dramatic impact on our city, we were able to say—for better or worse—"I was there!"

Of course, none of us were there at the event that changed everything the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Churches around the world celebrate Jesus' resurrection. But do we embrace the resurrection as an actual historical event, or do we simply see it as a fairytale? Sadly, many people view it as fiction and not fact. They see the resurrection as an "inspiring story" about a great teacher named Jesus, but they do not believe He is the true Messiah who was resurrected for all mankind.

The apostle Paul had something to say about that! In 1 Corinthians 15, Paul made an objective, truthful claim—Jesus did physically rise from the dead, and there were many witnesses. They could say, "I was there!"

LEVELS OF BIBLICAL LEARNING // JESUS

13 This week, how can you help someone understand that the resurrection is real?


14 How can you demonstrate in the ways you live that you've been raised with Christ?

DAILY DEVOTIONS



The 7 Arrows of **Bible Reading**



Day One JOHN 11:17-19

Mary, Martha, and Lazarus were some of Jesus' closest friends, and He loved them very much. In fact, when Jesus would come to Jerusalem for the feasts. He was known to stay with this family, as their home was a relatively short walk into the city. When Lazarus became sick, his sisters sent word to Jesus for help, but Jesus didn't hurry to them. Instead, He took His time, and by the time Jesus arrived in Bethany where His friends lived, Lazarus had been dead for four days. This is significant because Jews held a superstitious belief that a person's soul lingered near the body for three days after death, and a person could potentially come back to life. But after four days, the body began to rot and stink, and death was final! At least, that's what they thought.

How do you think Mary and Martha felt when Jesus didn't hurry to them?

> Why do you think He waited?

Day Two JOHN 11:20-22



Mary was known to be the more quiet and contemplative sister who kept to herself. Martha, on the other hand, was driven and outspoken, and when she heard that Jesus was near their home, she ran out to meet Him—and perhaps to give Him a piece of her mind. Why didn't you come sooner? If You'd been here, You could have healed my brother! Maybe she'd forgotten that Jesus had healed people from a distance. (See Mark 7:24-30; Matt. 8:5-13; John 4:46-54.) Either way, though she was upset on many levels, she held onto the hope that Jesus could bring something good from this tragedy.

When have you been upset that God didn't answer your requests the ways you wanted?

Day Three **JOHN 11:23-24**

Though Martha likely didn't believe Jesus could raise Lazarus—after all, it had been four days—she was hopeful that Jesus could bring good from the situation. When Jesus told her, "Your brother will rise again," her response was like ours often is-I know. I know. I know. I've heard it before. She'd learned throughout her life that, on the day of judgment, God's people would rise from the dead. But Martha wasn't happy about this. Her expression was one of disappointment. She wanted Lazarus to be alive now. But, as people often did, she had misunderstood what Jesus truly meant. Jesus wasn't referring to the resurrection on the last day. He had plans to give Martha something that was even better than she would have thought to ask for. However, up to that point, her mind wasn't open to seeing things from Jesus' perspective.

How can we make sure to be open-minded enough to hear from God, but not so open as to be led astray by false teaching?

Day Four JOHN 11:25

Day Five **JOHN 11:26-27**

When Jesus used the words "I am," they held great significance. In the Old Testament, when Moses asked God to reveal His name so Moses could tell the people who was sending him, God replied, tell them "I AM has sent me to you" (Ex. 3:14). "I AM" as the name of God carried a ton of weight in the Jewish culture, and Jesus used these very words in speaking to Martha. Using the name of God, Jesus said "I am the resurrection and the life." He helped Martha to see that the resurrection wasn't simply some far-off abstract concept, but mattered in her life at that moment. Further, the resurrection was possible only because of Jesus. In order to be raised, whether on the last day or on that very day, faith in Jesus was necessary.

> What is the significance of Jesus' referring to Himself as "I am"?

Throughout His ministry on earth, Jesus performed many miracles. The reason Jesus performed signs and wonders was to help those who were weak in faith to believe the truth about who He is. Only moments later, Jesus would raise Lazarus, and many who witnessed it were amazed and believed in Jesus (v. 45). However, Martha's experience was different. Many believed because of the miracle, but even before seeing this miracle, Martha believed. For her, Jesus' word was enough. He promised her that those who believe in Him will never die. And she believed.
