The Let God's love drive how you relate to others.

>1 THESSALONIANS 4:3-12

³For this is the will of God, your sanctification: that you abstain from sexual immorality; ⁴ that each one of you know how to control his own body in holiness and honor, ⁵ not in the passion of lust like the Gentiles who do not know God; ⁶ that no one transgress and wrong his brother in this matter, because the Lord is an avenger in all these things, as we told you beforehand and solemnly warned you. ⁷ For God has not called us for impurity, but in holiness. ⁸ Therefore whoever disregards this, disregards not man but God, who gives his Holy Spirit to you.

⁹Now concerning brotherly love you have no need for anyone to write to you, for you yourselves have been taught by God to love one another, ¹⁰ for that indeed is what you are doing to all the brothers throughout Macedonia. But we urge you, brothers, to do this more and more, ¹¹ and to aspire to live quietly, and to mind your own affairs, and to work with your hands, as we instructed you, ¹² so that you may walk properly before outsiders and be dependent on no one.

BIBLICAL LEARNING // PEOPLE

People are created as moral beings and are responsible for their choices and the consequences of their choices, including the ways we treat others. Some of our most enjoyable relationships may be those we had as small children. No drama. No demands on each other. We were just kids simply playing together and enjoying having someone to play with.

As we grow older, our tendency toward self-centeredness often seeps into our friendships. Somehow, our friendships become about ourselves and what the other person can do for us. Without even being aware, we place expectations on others that would mold our friends into who we want them to be. And when they won't cooperate, we simply find new friends. A simple friendship becomes complicated.

Wouldn't it be nice to get back to the simplicity of our childhood relationships. No drama—just accepting and enjoying one another in healthy ways. It's not as unrealistic or naive as we might think. Pursing simplicity in our lives includes our relationships, and in 1 Thessalonians, Paul gives us insights into what such an uncomplicated relationship looks like. It's all driven by love not a love for ourselves, but a love for God that carries over into how we treat others.

LEVELS OF BIBLICAL LEARNING // PEOPLE

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
God created us to live in a relationship with Him and with others. As we spend time knowing our heavenly Father, we grow to be more and more like Him. In turn, as we relate to others, we are to reflect the character of God in the ways we treat them. To treat people unlovingly goes against the very purpose for which God created and called us, and we will be held responsible for that. However, when we treat others lovingly, not only will we receive God's blessings, but God will use our love to draw others to Himself.

>CHRIST

Jesus said the way we treat others (specifically, the least of these—fellow believers facing difficult circumstances) is, in effect, how we treat Him (Matt. 25:40). At times, loving others well can be quite difficult. People will offend us, do things that get on our nerves, and make all sorts of mistakes—and we'll be tempted to be unkind, to stick our noses in places they don't belong, or to respond poorly when people confront us about things we've done wrong. Nonetheless, our relationship with Christ depends in a big way on how we relate to others.

COMMUNITY

All people are intended to live in relationship with God and with others. For Christians, we are called specifically to live in community with others in the church.

>CULTURE

Whereas we're to receive support and encouragement from relationships with other Christians, we are called to love the lost and to reach them with the gospel.



DAILY DEVOTIONS



The 7 Arrows of **Bible Reading**



Day One EPHESIANS 4:30

The lives of worldly people are characterized by selfishness and pride. However, for the child of God, our coming to faith in Christ involves having our hearts transformed. Our lives are changed inside and out, and as opposed to living for ourselves, we begin to live sacrificially for others. Though we are changed, as long as we are in this life, because of our sin nature, we will still struggle with temptation and fall short of God's standard. Make no mistake, because of the Spirit within us, we have the capacity to choose rightly. And when we sin, the Holy Spirit is grieved. However, for those who are truly part of God's family, we are adopted as sons and daughters, and He will never put us away. The Holy Spirit, who has sealed us for eternity, will convict us of our sins and draw us back to the place we should be—living by faith in God.

Day Two EPHESIANS 4:31



Because of sin's effects on the world, people are naturally inclined to treat one another in ways that don't reflect the character of God. Bitterness refers to a deep-seated and long-term spirit of resentment toward others. Anger is an internal feeling of dislike or hostility, and wrath is the acting out of those feelings. Shouting refers to aggressive communication and conflict, and slander is talking about others in a way that hurts their reputation. These all flow from a heart that desires bad things for others. Christians are called to be proactive in removing these from our lives.

When are you tempted to act in any of these ways?

Day Three **EPHESIANS 4:32a**

The attitudes and behaviors we see in verse 31 are common among non-believers. However, Christians are to be different. God calls us to be set apart, and the Holy Spirit empowers us to live differently. Instead of being characterized by such negative behaviors, children of God are to be defined by living sacrificially for the good of others. Compassion refers to sharing in others' experiences when they face difficult times. It means weeping when they weep—feelings of sympathy and concern for those who are hurting. Kindness is the working out of these feelings. Specifically, seeking the good of others and working to make them happy, particularly when they're experiencing hardship. Worldly people are concerned primarily with themselves, but the people of God are to be concerned with others above ourselves. Jesus lived this way, and we are to follow Him in this.

We're often tempted to think that, if we follow Christ and live in obedience to God's commands, our lives will be easy and happy. However, this isn't what the Bible teaches at all. In fact, Jesus said that we'll certainly face trouble. But at least we have our church family, and we'll always get along, right? While God has placed us with others in the church so we would love and encourage one another, the truth is that people within the church are just that-people! And we all have our fair share of weaknesses, and we will disappoint, offend, and hurt each other. Being a Christian doesn't mean no one will never hurt you or even that you'll never hurt others. It means that when we experience things like this, we're committed to working through it. Forgiveness means letting go of an offense for the purpose of seeing a relationship reconciled. Because unity is so important in the church, when others offend us, we have to be ready to forgive in order to live in healthy relationships with those in our church family.

Scripture teaches that we've all sinned and fallen short of God's standards. And this "falling short" isn't just a minor slip that hurt God's feelings a little bit—we've blasphemed and rebelled and committed the worst kinds of offenses against the holy and sovereign Creator of the universe. We deserve the worst kind of punishment, and because God is just, sin can't go unpunished. In order for us to receive forgiveness, someone had to pay for our sins, so Jesus suffered the penalty for our sins on the cross. Because we've been forgiven so much, if we're truly appreciative, we should in turn be happy to forgive others who offend us.
